Supporting Student Completion with RSI and Making the Most of the CVC Course Exchange | Zoom

This workshop is designed for faculty, staff, and management to explore the latest updates and effective strategies for optimizing student success through Regular Substantive Interaction (RSI) and the California Virtual Campus (CVC) Course Exchange. Attendees will learn how aligning courses with the CVC OEI Rubric can enhance RSI standards and improve course visibility, ultimately increasing cross-enrollment opportunities.

This workshop will highlight the various tools faculty can use to ensure they are meeting RSI requirements in their online courses. Additionally, the workshop will present recent enrollment trends and showcase high-demand courses. We will also guide participants through the student journey, from discovering and enrolling in courses to accessing key resources such as financial aid and automated transcript processing, providing insights on how to better assist students in navigating the course exchange.

By the end of the session, participants will gain a deeper understanding of RSI, the CVC Course Exchange's role in supporting student success, and practical strategies to help students effectively complete their academic programs.

Create AI-powered Tools Using Playlab AI | Zoom

Did you know you can create your own custom Al Chatbot? No programming experience necessary!

Perhaps you are someone with a wealth of knowledge on a topic and want to create a bot to answer those FAQs without having to reply to a lot of emails.

Maybe you'd like students to be able to get useful feedback on practice problems or essays but you can't commit to being available to do so 24 hours a day.

You could want an easy way of keeping track of Cuesta's priorities in all of its planning documents so you can quickly and what you are looking for while working on program review.

In this session, we'll look at examples of custom AI Chatbots for and then move on to best practices for AI Chatbot creation while making a chatbot in real time! No subscription to ChatGPT is necessary; PlayLab AI (an education-focused custom chatbot maker) has collaborated with The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office and the UC Berkeley School of Education to provide access to CCC employees.

This session is open to anyone interested in how AI may be useful to them. While the presenter is an instructor, non-instructional uses for AI chatbots will be discussed.

Somatic Antiracism Book Club | Zoom

This gathering approaches the reading of the novel, The Water Dancer, by Ta-Nehisi Coates, from an Antiracism/Somatic Abolitionism practice developed by racial trauma therapist, Dr. Resmaa Menakem. Unlike many traditional book clubs, completion of reading the novel is not a primary goal. Instead, we will lean into the role and value of creating spaces for experiential understanding and community building as necessary components of antiracism. Participants are first introduced to this particular antiracism practice before exploring the novel's themes of violence and persecution of black bodies, the legacy of slavery and intergenerational racial trauma, displacement, and the role of memory and storytelling as a wellspring for resilience. As a white-body facilitator/faculty member, antiracism practice within the white community will be emphasized; participants from all communities are welcome and invited to contribute. During this first gathering we will determine the schedule for when we will meet on Zoom for future gatherings throughout the Spring 2025 semester.

Book Club: Linda Hogan's Mean Spirit | Zoom

Peer Observation Pool (POP)

The Peer Observation Pool (POP) is an informal structure for faculty to learn from each other by spending time in colleagues' classrooms/DE courses. POP is entirely independent of the formal evaluation process. Participating practitioners will be placed in a POP Pod, a group of 3-4 faculty with common interests, such as engendering a sense of belonging, ways to engage students, and strategies for teaching online. Faculty commit to: 1) observing 2-3 other faculty teach/course (DE), 2) being observed by 2-3 faculty, 3) meeting with their POP Pod once or twice during the semester and 4) gathering for a celebratory dinner at the end of the semester.
